Breakfast Club

If you haven't already done so and you would like to book your child into breakfast club, please e-mail <u>admin@filleigh-primary.devon.sch.uk</u>.

Breakfast club is open to pre-school children up to year 6.

You must book in advance so we ensure we have enough members of staff to comply with the ratios.

Parental conduct:

We have recently had it brought to our attention that some of the conversations amongst parents on school grounds are involving increasing examples of inappropriate language, i.e., swearing. We ask that you please be mindful of the nature of a school environment when chatting to others to ensure pupils feel comfortable and safe.

Reporting Absence:

When your child is absent from school you MUST contact the school to inform us that your child will be absent, the reason for their absence and their expected return date to school.



<u>DoJo</u>

DoJo is the platform we use to keep you updated daily of what your child has been doing in their classes. As well as separate class pages there is a whole school news fed where we share important information about things like what they need to bring into school, what to wear on different days and what events are coming up.

96% of the parents / carers are connected to DoJo – for those of you who aren't, we will send home the log on details to enable you to connect to DoJo.

For children in Foxes class, we are aware you use Tapestry, however DoJo is extremely useful to have alongside this as this is where we share vital school information as mentioned above.



STAGS:

Stags have been working hard to get their heads around fractions this month. They have created their own fraction walls and used this to find equivalent fractions and simplify.

Our next step is to look at using the four operations (multiplication, division, subtraction and addition) using fractions, too. We know Stags are ready for the challenge because of the resilience they have already shown. Well done, Stags!

In English, Stags have been writing persuasive letters to local councillors asking them to make vital changes in order to reduce climate change. Pupils have worked really hard to make effective word choices and show awareness of the reader to produce powerful and convincing arguments. Brilliant!







In History, we have been learning about the Ancient Egyptians. This seems to be a specialist subject for some of our Stags, who have lots of interesting facts to bring to our learning. We have focussed on the importance of tomb paintings and carvings in helping us to know what life was like in Ancient Egyptian civilisations. Stags have also created their own "carvings" to depict life nowadays and have used hieroglyphics to describe scenes and images. Great work Stags!


We enjoyed using the Forest School area to consolidate our number bonds to 10.

> In Pre-School we have continued to support our children to develop their vocabulary and communication - such valuable skills. We do this through playing lots of games, through our phonics sessions - learning to listen very carefully but also by joining in their chats as they play.

Reception children have been developing their understanding of numbers, learning to subitise (just 'see' a small group of objects without counting) as well as adding some of these groups together to make bigger numbers.
